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Relocation of BTBA Head Office

Over the last 2 years the National Council have been striving to streamline the BTBA finances and operational efficiency. Since relocation to Romford, Head Office has cost an average of £75K per annum which represents approximately 70% of our total Membership Fees.

Reducing that financial burdens has been a major focus of the National Council and we are therefore pleased that the Head Office of the BTBA has now been outsourced and relocated to Market Deeping, Lincolnshire. This action will reduce our overheads by over £50K instantly and introduce a new and innovative dimension to the way our Headquarters operates. It will place a greater burden of responsibility on the National Council and they both individually and collectively have accepted a greater degree of involvement in the day to day affairs of the organisation.

The new BTBA Head Office is located within a modern Local Government owned Business Centre with access to Meeting & Conference facilities the utilisation of which will further reduce our outgoings. The BTBA National Council wish to extend our sincere thanks to them all and particularly to Bernice Bass who has served us loyally for over 40 years.

Sadly, a number of BTBA records were lost in a fire many years ago so we are unable to identify other bowlers who might qualify, so please do let us know by contacting Head Office.

We are fortunate to have received from Steve White the following account of his 50 years of bowing in Kent. Many thanks indeed Steve!

"I was introduced to bowling by a work college who already bowled in a league at the old Bexleyheath bowl, which is now an Asda's. We used to bowl on our early closing day with some other work mates. From this I got the bug for bowling and quickly joined a league all with the help of the then Manageress Janet Morrison. This one league then became two then three then four. After a few years I found myself secretary of the then Spartan Doubles League later to become trios. I ran the league for over 30 years, during those years I then became secretary for the Olympic League which I still run today and have up to date been a league secretary for over 45 years.

In my early years I used to go to Dagenham Bowl to watch the good bowlers to see how it was done, I believe it was the Supreme League which was a five-person league. My favourites had to be The Wembley All Stars. It was through bowling that I met my wife Sheila and we have been married 42 years. I feel very fortunate that my era of bowling was when it was, the bowls were mostly run by bowlers and knew what was expected and did all they could to encourage new people to the sport, sadly that does not seem to be the case these days. Our local association was at the time the S.E.B.A. and our area championships were so large that they had to be run over four weekends.

I have been fortunate to represent my County of Kent in both the Adults and now Seniors for many years and even won an Adult Gold medal sadly our only one to date. At my peak I averaged 208 but never had an 800 or a 300, I have however had 28 700's and a 299 and a



298. Sadly, with 5 shoulder operations my bowling is not what it was and now average about 175. I still try and make the Kent team each year and normally I'm the captain when I do. My regret with bowling is the demise of numbers and the lack of centres willing to promote League bowling, my 4-man League is down to 10 teams (most of the bowlers have been in the league for over 40 years) and do not see how I can replace teams as they leave.

As I said I feel fortunate to have bowled when I did when Leagues and Local Tournaments were plentiful. I will carry on bowling until my body says enough because I enjoy all the people that I have known and met these last 50 years. Thank you"

What Safeguarding means to the BTBA/NAYBC

As the recently appointed Safeguarding Officer for the BTBA and NAYBC I thought it may be useful to write a short article so that members are aware of what Safeguarding means and what the role of Safeguarding Officer entails within the BTBA and NAYBC.

Firstly, I would like to introduce myself. My name is Hayley Rumkee and I have been a member of the BTBA for 19 years. I am a trained social worker and from 2010 to 2013 I worked as a Child Protection Social worker. My front line experience within this field has given me the knowledge and understanding I require to undertake the Safeguarding Officer role within the BTBA and NAYBC. I continue to work as a social worker today and therefore undertake regular training and workshops to allow me to continue my Safeguarding Officer role effectively.

What is Safeguarding?

Safeguarding is the protection of vulnerable adults or children from any form of abuse or neglect.

Why do we need a Safeguarding Officer?

Any establishment, club or governing body that comes into contact with or are responsible for children or vulnerable adults should have a designated Safeguarding Officer. This should be someone with relevant knowledge and up to date training around Safeguarding. This is to ensure that all members are appropriately safeguarded whilst at BTBA or NAYBC events, this includes tournaments, YBC days and other bowling events.

Although I am the 'Designated Safeguarding Officer' for the BTBA and NAYBC the actual responsibility of safeguarding children and vulnerable adults within our governing body falls to 'EVERYBODY'. So if you have a concern regarding a child or vulnerable adult then please get in touch.



What does a Safeguarding Officer do?

A Safeguarding Officer should ensure that all Policies and Procedures for Safeguarding are relevant and up to date. I am currently working my way through the current Safeguarding Policies and Procedures for the BTBA to ensure that these documents are relevant and effective.'

They should also ensure that all members, particularly those who are coaching/instructing/helping children or vulnerable adults on a regular basis, have the relevant knowledge and training around safeguarding. This is also something which is being carefully considered and there will be updates to follow regarding this.

A Safeguarding officer will give advice if anyone has concerns about a child or any other member of the BTBA/NAYBC. A Safeguarding Officer is NOT responsible to decide whether a child or vulnerable adult has been or is being abused or not. This responsibility falls to investigative statutory agencies such as Children's Social Care of Police. However, it is the Safeguarding Officers responsibility to decide how information is recorded and managed.

What does this mean for the BTBA and NAYBC?

If anyone within the BTBA or NAYBC, whether you are an official, parent or carer, has concerns regarding any child this should be reported to the Safeguarding Officer. There is now a designated email address which is safeguarding@btba.org.uk

Gill Hutchison - "Sleep Tight and Thank you"

I have been asked by Ron Griffin to put some words together, as it is with the greatest sadness that the bowling community has learned of the unexpected passing of Gill Hutchison, Area Secretary for Lincolnshire, who died peacefully on 12 December.

Whether it be helping a YBC at one of her local (or not so local) centres, giving advice to another county association on a sticky matter or just generally popping in to get some more info for the latest Lincs newsletter, Gill was always there for anyone needing a hand, championing successes and offering the supportive words. The time and effort put in by her through fundraising, attending as many events where Lincolnshire bowlers were playing as possible, and being an ambassador for not only Lincolnshire but the sport as a whole was second to none.

But Gill was so much more than just the secretary of her Local Association, a job she had done for nearly 30 years - she was also the most passionate, caring and generous-spirited of people. Never afraid to right a wrong or to raise a concern, she always did so with respect and good grace and occasional humour - nobody else could have made a point about "Trousergate" at the Senior Counties in quite the way Gill did!

Not one to idle in between the newsletters, sanction paperwork, Hundred Club and coaching, Gill was also a keen writer and artist. She regularly went to Writers Groups and had just completed her Post Graduate Degree in Creative Writing. A talented wordsmith - in no small part due to her being a retired English teacher - Gill could always be relied upon for a cheerful anecdote as much as a chastisement without the slightest hint of malice.

In short, it is not just the bowling world that has lost a great friend but also that of the writers clubs and seminars she attended, as well as the hundreds - if not thousands - of former pupils who clearly still hold her in such high regard. She has left an impossible hole to fill, both within Lincolnshire and the hearts of everyone who were blessed to have known her.

However the loss that we all feel towards the "Bowling Mum" of many is dwarfed by that which must be felt by her immediate family right now. Our hearts and best wishes go out to Al and Fiona, as well as her granddaughter Thea - who she idolised - and the rest of her family.

The world is a little darker without your ray of sunshine in it Gill, but we are all grateful to have had that illumination in our lives - even if it wasn't for as long as we would have hoped.

With Fareham Havant and Portsmouth heavily represented across all age groups it was the under 19 girls that proved to be souths shining light with four of the six qualifiers bowling at Gunwharf Bowlplex.

After six games of qualifying the top three moved on to the stepladder final with second playing third for a place in the final. Megan Jagger (Havant YBC) qualified second but was undone as Alexia Francis-Robertson (Havant YBC) hit the best game of the day to get through to the final.

The final proved to be very close, top qualifier Leanne Spivey (Portsmouth YBC) matching Alexia all the way and both performing well despite the growing audience. The game coming down to the final ball with Leanne requiring a single pin to win but missing to leave the match tied. Both girls then had to step up again, re-playing the last two frames, with the rest of the players having finished and now watching.

Leanne was first up, hitting a strike, which Alexia couldn't match. Leanne then spared in the tenth frame and finished with a 9. Alexia now needed three strikes for the title, a feat that proved too much, leaving the title going to Portsmouth YBC's Leanne Spivey to much applause.
