Midlands Scratch League - Round Three



The third round of the Midland Scratch League took place on the 26th January. Now in its 23rd season, it still remains strong and retains the honour of being the largest travelling league in the country. With 33 teams in four divisions hailing from as far afield as Shrewsbury, Lincoln, Stroud and Dunstable, and with averages from 150 up to 220, it really is the travelling league that welcomes all ages and abilities. 16 points are awarded per game, and there are 7 games per round. 2 points awarded head-to-head and 6 points for the overall team game win.

Here are the movers and shakers at the mid-way point

Premier Division – Rugby

Rugby played host to the Premier for their third round, alongside Division 3! Despite its imminent closure, and some tricky conditions it continued to look after us well.

llkeston continue to lead the field with 246 points from a possible 336 so far, with Darren Cundy bowling the high game of the day with a not-to -be-bettered 300. However Merry Hill aren't too far behind on 205. The middle of the table is all to play for, with Riverside third on 179 just a point ahead of Waddington. Fifthplaced Warwick, who struggled to maintain their momentum, are just 9 points further back on 169 whilst Worcester are sixth just four points further behind. Relegation spots with Peterborough and remain

Kettering with **120** and **82** points respectively. However, with 3 rounds left to go, there is plenty of time for this all to change!

Division One – Ilkeston

The highest scoring day seen by Division 1 was had at Ilkeston, where the championship is pretty much certain, but the second promotion spot very much up for grabs.

Stroud are leading the pack on a staggering 1040 average (including 1106 average over the 7 games at llkeston) with **267** points! This is followed by a 3-way fight for 2nd, with **Bushbury, Shrewsbury** and **Rugby** on **199, 196 and 180** points respectively. However, don't rule out **Worcester Everoak, 17** points further back on **163.** The three remaining teams are **Walsgrave (147) Lickey End (103)** and **Burton (89).**

Division Two – Lincoln

Playing a week later than the rest of the league due to one of the teams being in a British Universities' Tournament, Chesterfield maintain their lead on 209 points, followed closely by Gotham on 200. A small but not unassailable gap of 27 sees Northampton on 173 whilst 4 points are all that separates Stratford (166), Olton (164) and Coningsby (162) all of whom are still in contention for promotion, as a 30 point deficit can easily be overcome in 3 rounds! Birmingham and Acock's Green bring up the final two spots with 143 and 127 points respectively. Chesterfield lead with the high game for the season on 1155 - their new league record score - whilst Gotham (1132) and Coningsby (1103) Complete the mid-season accolades. Division Two certainly remains a division to watch!

Division Three – Rugby

The fact that the MSL will now not fit at Coventry, has led to Division Three joining up with other divisions during the season, as previously all teams have bowled together there, however this year we have too many! This is one such round, where they accompanied the Premier division at Rugby.

Newbies Trent Lock (258) and Bedfordshire (231) continue to head up the table, whilst Greyfriars hold on to 3rd place with 211. Fiveways lead the next cluster of teams with 183, whilst Nuneaton chases them with 170, and once again less than a games' worth of points separate a number of teams, with 12 points separating Nuneaton in 4th from Tamworth in 8th, with Newcastle, and Scrubby Bottoms filling the gaps. St. George's (144) completes the field whose captain, Scot Williams, bowled a 298 in the last round at MFA Nottingham.

As is mentioned above, Rugby Superbowl will be closing its doors in the coming weeks. This is a sad loss for the sport, and particularly for the Midland Scratch League. It is one thing when companies close centres that aren't making a profit, but it's thing entirely when a another successful business has to shut down due to its landlord forcing its hand. Rugby shall be sorely missed, and I would like to put on record my thanks, on behalf of the Midland Scratch League, to Andrew, Yasmin and the rest of the team at Rugby who have served us so well. We wish you every luck in the future, and hope that the future works in your favour after what is undoubtedly a difficult time for you all

His brother **Jason** tried a late challenge to the lead but just fell short to qualify in 2nd place. Qualifying comfortably in 3rd place was **Allan Rockach** but the battle was on for 4th. It was a very close finish with only 15 pins between 4th and 8th place but it was **Billy Warnes** who managed to take the last place in the stepladder final.

Onto the stepladder final where the first match saw Allan beat Billy **237** to 210, Allan then went on to beat 2nd placed Jason **254** to 213 but he was unable to beat in form Karl and went down 197 to **258**. The Chown brothers also managed to clean up on the high game prizes apart from the 1st game which was shared between Karl and Allan.

Universities and Colleges Nationals Results

Over 130 student bowlers made their way to Sheffield's MFA Bowl at Firth Park on the weekend of 22nd and 23rd February. The competition was split into male and female team and individual sections. With each entrant bowling a total of nine games in a variety of squad sizes on three challenging patterns. The winner would be the team and individual with the highest total pin fall.

As ever promised by BUCS Championships, bowling a competition purely based on scratch scores heightened the competitiveness of all concerned. Perhaps even more so this year, with news that the awards ceremony would be presided over by the BTBA's Jo Cundy (Head of Elite), Team England's Nicki Ainge, and Yorkshire TBA President Les Grant (many thanks to you all!).



The University of Birmingham

Saturday:

The Championships kicked off on Saturday morning with the Women and Men bowling doubles squads.

After bowling brilliantly all year, nobody was surprised to see Nottingham at the top of the tables somewhere along the line. Their Women's team was in first place on 1319, ahead of the University of Lincoln. Just 80 pins behind Lincoln were Loughborough.

One of the most competitive universities this year was Loughborough, particularly on the Men's side, who were 1st after the doubles. There was more distance between the top three Men's teams than the Women's. There was a large gap between 1st and 3rd, with Sheffield some 197 pins behind 2nd place Nottingham on a 3006. Nottingham, following in the footsteps of their girls, were on a 3203, yet still some 243 pins behind Loughborough.

Sunday:

With the Men's trios completed Loughbrough still led the competition with a final trios set of 3152, giving them a total of 6598, a massive 381 pins ahead of 2nd place Nottingham who, with a final trios set of 3014 are now sitting on a 6217. Sheffield were 3rd, with their two trios teams bowling a total of 2876, finishing overall on a team total of 5882. Birmingham Men shot themselves up the tables with an impressive 2712 from their trios teams, giving them a total of 5498 and a brilliant chance of a medal finish overall.

Universities and Colleges Nationals Results

Nottingham held their 2nd place spot, with an impressive 602 in the Singles, putting their total up to 6819, closing the gap going into the team event. Sheffield lie in 3rd with a 471 from their Singles, pushing them to a total so far of 6353. Birmingham have been knocked down by Nottingham Trent, who climbed to 4th after a 600 series in the Singles.

After the women's trios, Loughborough have climbed to be in the lead adding a 1297 to their total, followed closely by Lincoln on a two person (plus 80 pin blind per game) score of 1249 for the trios. Nottingham have kept their place in the top 3, being on 1182 for their trios.



The University of Nottingham

Lincoln, despite having only two bowlers, impressively climbed to the top of the tables finishing on a team total of 3875 (1343 in the Singles). Loughborough finished in 2nd overall, with their team bowling a grand total of 3828 (1328 in the Singles). Nottingham clung on to their top 3 spot, finishing 3rd overall with a total of 3797 (1296 in the Singles).

Going in to the men's five man team event, three universities were battling it out for the top

spot; Loughborough, Sheffield and Nottingham. Despite a valiant battle from Nottingham - hitting an impressive 1,000 pins in the final Fives game and clawing back over 100 pins - it wasn't enough to catch Loughborough. Sheffield clung on to their 3rd place spot on a grand total of 8839. A massive 837 pins in front of Sheffield was Nottingham, finishing on an impressive 9676. However, nobody could stop Loughborough, finishing on a 9871, over 190 pins ahead of Nottingham.

This year saw new awards given out at the Championships. The 'Highest Placed 2nd Team' went to Loughborough Men's B.

BUCS also introduced medals for both the male and female Most Improved and Best Newcomer.

Birmingham truly proved how much hard work and dedication can pay off in this sport, with both Most Improved Performance prizes being won by members of their university team. For the women, Reena Kaur impressed with an improvement of 323 pins on her performance last year. The men's Most Improved was won by Shaun Parsons, who, finishing 5th this year on a 1697, improved his performance from last year by a whole series, scoring a massive 471 pins more than last year.

Best Newcomer on the women's side was won by Team Wales and University of Lincoln bowler, Carrie Anne Rogers, for her 161.3 average over the weekend. As the winner of the men's Best Newcomer was part of a medalist team, the Best Newcomer was awarded to an individual from outside the medal winners, this year going to UCL student, Will Pearson, who finished in 4th place with a 189.9 average.

From the huge buzz around one of the most challenging BUCS Champs in recent memory we can tell there are already many looking forward to next year!

BTBA Adult and Senior Tours to move to Membership Services

As part of the ongoing shaping of the BTBA the decision has been made to move the responsibility for managing the Adult and Senior Tours to Membership Services.

The Tours are intended to attract players of all levels, not just those considered to be amongst the elite at each age group, and it is felt that this would be better reflected by placing the management of these events under the Membership Services banner.

Player's Perspective: World Series of Bowling

The World Series of Bowling is one of the most physically and mentally challenging tournaments we bowl. Each day is a completely different tournament!



Patterns:

Day 1 Cheetah - Cheetah is 36 ft. long and you play to the extreme outside of the lane. For me I look for a very smooth ball that does not over react on dry. I threw a Melee with pin in the palm and switched to a little stronger Melee the last few games when the lanes opened up.

Comments/Results

The Cheetah qualifying was pretty disappointing for me. I finished in 98th place averaging 221. I made a few bad moves which cost me pins.

Day 2 Viper - Viper is 39 ft. long and on this pattern you start in the track, (around second arrow) with a medium to weak bowling ball and switch to stronger and stronger bowling balls as the oil carries down. I threw a Versa Max to start and switched to a few different Melees for the last few games. <u>Comments/Results</u> - Viper has always been my worst pattern. I just never seem to get the right angles. I ended up finishing 63^{rd} and averaging 210.

Day 3 Chameleon - Chameleon is 43 ft. long and on this pattern we start in the track with medium to strong bowling balls. I threw two different Melees all day, both drilled the same but with different surfaces, one had 2000 grit and the other 1000 grit.

Comments/Results - In my short career, I have always had more success on longer patters and it really showed in the years World Series of Bowling. I ended up leading the 7 game qualifier averaging 243 and after match play, I ended up qualifying fourth for the ESPN Finals! I lost my first match to Ryan Ciminelli. Ryan, a DV8 staffer, ended up winning the Chameleon Championship.

Day 4 Scorpion - This year they lengthened this pattern from 41 ft. to 47ft. which made this pattern play very, very slick. Everyone started a little right of the track with very strong balls and with a lot of surface. I threw a couple of different masterminds and switched to a DV8 Dude the last two games.

<u>Comments/Results</u> - The Scorpion has always been my favourite pattern. I qualified 2nd. On the show I bowled Josh Blanchard. It was a See-Saw match and we ended up in a tie bowling with a



score of 232. The tie breaker is a one bowl roll off. We were both tied again at 4 strikes a piece until the fifth frame. I came out of top with a strike and Josh left a ten pin. The next match I bowled a young up and coming bowler, Marshall Kent. It was a close match the whole game. He threw a 7-10 split in the ninth game making me only needing a mark in the tenth frame to win. Luckily, I kept it all together and spared the 10pin that I left to clinch my second career PBA National Title.

World Championship - The World Championship pattern is 41 ft. long and most players played way right with strong balls and stayed there almost all match-play. I threw medium strength balls including a few Melees with 500 to 1000 grit, I also threw a DV8 Dude.

Comments/Results - To qualify for the World Championship match-play, they take the top 24 accumulative scores from the 4 animal pattern 7 game qualifiers. I qualified 14th. I was close to being in the show most of match-play. I ended up throwing the last 11 strikes the last game of match-play to go from 6th place to 4th, making my third World Championship Final. On the show, my first match was against Pete Weber. I threw a Versa Max the whole game but I made one bad shot that ultimately cost me the match scoring 237-257.

Report from Jo Cundy - Head of Elite Bowling

Dates and venues are now confirmed for the Team England Trials. The closing date for entries was Friday 28thFebruary. I have listened to many bowlers out there and I know that it will not be perfect, yet! Change is never easy but you have to be in it to win it!

During the months of January and February many counties have their county trials I would like to thank all the county secretaries and managers for getting their county intents back to me on time. Special mention for Steph Tilson who not only sent Norfolk's intent but also trials results and registration forms, by the second week in January! I can let you know that the Southern regions County round will be on Sunday 7th September at Tolworth. The Central regions County round will be on Sunday 7th at Nuneaton. The Northern regions County round will be at Sheffield on Sunday 7th September.

February 8th was a special date in my diary this year, I held the first ever Team England meeting where all age groups managers, coaches, selectors and members from the National Council met altogether. This was an opportunity to talk about the future, working together and the next steps. The QubicaAMF Bowling World Cup, A History: Part 2 - Attendance

Back in 1965, whilst the event achieved massive worldwide press coverage, it attracted only 20 nations and it was men only. Since that time the event has grown and grown and grown. Singapore holds the record for having the most number of participating countries when it attracted 95 in 2004.

The Bowling World Cup has been to some rather challenging locations but probably no more so than the 49th edition in Krasnoyarsk. To get there from New York you have to face at least 2 overnight flights. Although upon your return you can do it in one day but a very long one, as the time difference makes your day 37 hours long! Russia is big and if you route through Moscow there is still another 5 hour flight to be faced.

Expected weather conditions in

November are, for everyone except the locals, bleak. Temperatures are typically around minus twenty Celsius and anything falling from the sky is white. Even so, 76 nations braved the elements. To their surprise, and disappointment to some, Krasnoyarsk was going through a bit of a heat wave. In the beginning it rained, had temperatures that were positive rather than negative and didn't see snow and chilly temperatures until just before everyone was leaving.

For many years, alongside competitors, industry experts have attended to share knowledge with others as the event moves from city to city, country to country. Bowling Centre management and marketing seminars, pinspotter courses and the subject of lane maintenance have all been held and have formed an integral part of this road show.
